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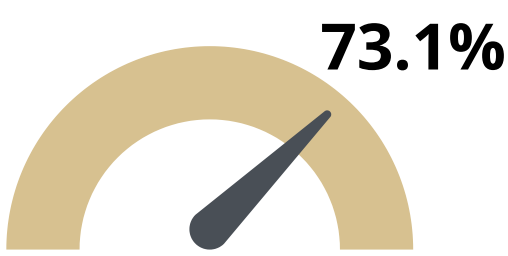


About the Survey

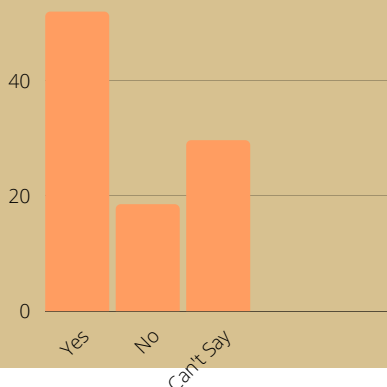

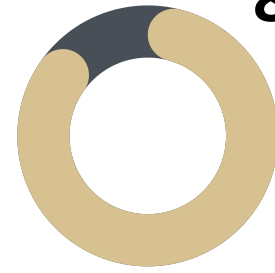


Whether course content is easily understandable to the learners

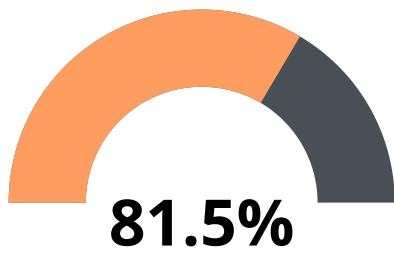

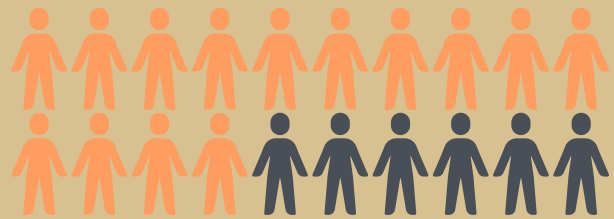


Whether the curricula offered meet the requirements of the job market
